The 2014 Race for the Green Jacket



Congratulations to **Kieran McGill** for deservedly winning his first green jacket in exciting circumstances on the last competitive day of the year.

Below is Kieran's recap of the final four-ball on the final day:

The "middle of the pack" threesome of **Stephen Colman**, **Kieran McGill** and **Brian Boland** set out, starting in the anonymity of the 10th tee, away from the hoopla surrounding the four leading groups on no.1 tee.

Secure in the knowledge that our scores didn't count for anything other than the scraps, we decided to enjoy the beautiful fall day. **McGill** suitably fortified with a John Daly drink to kick things off, started with a par, par, bogey and was the leader of the group with eight points after three holes.



After a brief flirtation with the thought of the chance of 44 Points bringing him back into the action, he soon got back into his comfort zone with scratches on holes 13 and 14. **Colman** who didn't have his best stuff showed all the consistency and sometimes temperament of Mario Balotelli in front of goal, with occasional laser like shots followed by those that had more in common with a Ryan Air flight – they looked good in the air but landed a long way from the ultimate destination.

Boland, from the start, showed all the class that his 5 handicap would suggest with a tap in par on the difficult 10th. However, it became evident that the recovery from his ACL surgery (he had more strapping on his left knee than an Egyptian Mummy) had left him a little rusty in the short game department. Ever the optimist though he decided that nutrition was the answer and produced his lunch cooler from the back of the cart. When we added up the scores at the end, to our great surprise, **McGill** had somehow accumulated 39 points, which we felt might have been competitive for the day prize. It never occurred to us that circumstances were such that it may even challenge for a Green Jacket!

Match Play Recap of 2014



The 2014 Green Tour Matchplay tournament produced great contests and many memorable moments before the champion was ultimately crowned on a gorgeous fall (or autumn) day in Druid Hills.

In the Padraig Harrington bracket, **Fergal Kearns** got off to a fast start with a comprehensive victory over **David Walsh**. **Colm Reilly** won a very close contest over **Tom Daly**, with **Daly** showing early season signs

of the promise that saw him emerge as a leading contender for the Green Jacket as the year unfolded. In the bracket final, **Reilly** gained the upper hand early on, but **Kearns** showed remarkable capacity to stay in the hunt and with a strong performance on the back nine did just enough to emerge as winner, winning the bracket in the process.

In the Darren Clarke bracket, **Noel Goggin** was heavily favored given his performances as a rookie on tour, and he started strongly with a good victory over **Irial Finan** and then followed up with another strong showing against **Chalky White**. On the other side of the draw, **Brian Mahony** saw off **Micheál Smith** in the first round and then produced his best form of the year in a clash of Druid Hills members, beating out **Kieran McGill** for the second year in a row. In the final match for the bracket, **Mahony** started slowly, but turned the match around just after the turn and seemed to be in a very strong position. However, a few lapses in standard coupled with **Goggin**'s spectacularly steady play placed **Goggin** in the lead, and he made no mistake in closing the match out on the 17th green.

In the Rory McIlroy bracket perennial contenders **Ciaran Morris** and **Eoin Lehane** were odds-on to be the players to progress to the bracket final match which is exactly how the bracket played out. **Don O'Reilly** had a substantial victory over **Michael Walsh** in the first round, but was then on the receiving end of the **Lehane** buzzsaw. **Lehane** was victorious over **Ciaran O'Flaherty** in his first round match, and after seeing off **O'Reilly** he was into the bracket final. In the meantime, **Ciaran Morris** was building a nice head of steam with victories over **Bernard McGuinness** and **Paul Valentine** to set up a mouth-watering clash to decide bracket winner. **Morris**, however, had too much in his bag of tricks on the day and was comfortable in overcoming **Lehane** to make his way into the semi-finals as bracket winner.

In the Graeme McDowell bracket, **Michael O'Driscoll** showed early form in beating out previous winner **Peter Casey**, but then lost out in the battle of the Oldcastle boys to the BPNTHWAM **Stephen Colman**. On the other side of the bracket teak-tough competitor **Ian Murdock** won his

first round match over **Garret O'Malley**, but was second best to champion **Martin McDonnell** in the second round. **McDonnell** beat **Jim O'Sullivan** in the first round and then showed his competitive instincts in beating **Murdock** by the minimum margin. In the bracket final, **Colman** showed the form that entitles him to the BPNTHWAM tag by beating the champion by a comfortable margin.

The scene was now set for the semi-finals, with fellow Nor'siders **Morris** and **Colman** playing each other, and **Goggin** squaring off against **Kearns**. **Kearns** and **Goggin** played out a great contest at Bears Best, and although **Goggin** played well, **Kearns** demonstrated a sense of tactical nous and course management that had not heretofore been observed in the man from the Wesht, with the pride of Athenry winning out on a scoreline of 2&1. In the Nor'sider semifinal, decades of friendship were put to one side in a contest which ultimately saw **Morris** emerge as victor by 3&2.

The final was played out in early October between **Morris**, the 2013 best gross player of the year and **Kearns**, the hope for all high handicappers. **Kearns** stepped preparations up a notch by having a caddie on his bag – a first for a Green Tour competition?

Morris took an early advantage, and although the match had swung back to **Kearns** by the turn, the match was all square after 11. In a pivotal run of holes, **Kearns** produced his best form to run off a string of wins, and closed out the match on 15.



Match-play Final Recap: Morris vs. Kearns

On a glorious (but blustery!) Fall Day in early October, Ciaran Morris and Fergal Kearns played the final match of the 2014 Green Tour Championship, with Kearns emerging as victor on the 15th green.

Off the first tee, Morris hit the kind of hook that used to be his personal brand on tour, with Kearns finding trees on the right side of the fairway. Morris hit a glorious recovery to just in front of the green and a nerveless chip left him with a tap in for a fine par. Kearns was safely on the putting surface in 3 strokes, but a nervy first putt gifted Morris the hole – first blood to the former Green Jacket winner!

On the second, Morris hit a hookier hook off the tee, and having failed to find his first ball was forced to play out his provisional. Kearns also elected to hit driver into the strong breeze, finding trees on the right for the second hole in succession. After a blizzard of swipes, we needed a calculator to confirm that the hole was halved.

A super tee shot on the 3rd was a confidence booster for Morris – with the hook conquered and converted into a shapely looking draw, and a 1-hole lead already on the scoreboard, the pressure was on Kearns to respond. A high hook into trees left was hardly the response he was

hoping for. Morris was unlucky to find his ball in a crater of sorts, and had to take a safety-first tactic to lay up short of the water in front of the green. In a scene reminiscent of Bagger Vance, Kearns spied a path through the trees and although the ball decided to take a different route than intended, a favorable rebound from one of the limbs landed Kearns on the back of the green, from where he was able to win the hole. Back to all square, and a contest on our hands!

The fourth was all highlight reel stuff for Kearns; a super drive down the right side, an outstanding approach shot to the back of the green, and a nerveless putt to tap-in range left Morris in his wake. Morris reacted with a fine par on 5 to take the match back to all square again. A solid par for Kearns on 6 gave him a 1-up lead. With a hybrid club in hand, Kearns outdrove Morris on the 7th, and after a smart layup, he got greedy on his approach and landed in the greenside trap, short sided. Another one for the highlights reel though – an aggressive swing launched the ball directly at the flag, which it hit at around mid-height, dropping to tap-in range. An omen, if one was needed, that this might be his day!

With Kearns at 2up, the eight hole was a forgettable half. Kearns found the road off the tee on 9, and although he parred his second ball, it looked like the advantage was with Morris when he hit the green in regulation. A timid first putt was his undoing though, and it left Kearns heading to the 10th with the unexpected advantage of a 2-hole lead.

Kearns, however, went AWOL on 10 and 11, and with Morris playing fine golf, the match was all square after 11. Morris had reason to be satisfied after 11 – he crushed a drive, hit a fine second on the surface to record a routine par – and seemed to have weathered the storm. On the 12th tee, both players hit pop-up drives, which left them over 185 yards out on the short par 4. Morris hit first, and advanced to ball to the rough on the right of the green. Playing like a champion-elect, Kearns hit a magnificent 6 iron from fully 185 yards that started toward the right side of the green and drew off the hanging lie to just left of the green – very close to the water hazard, but also very close to the pin on that side of the green. A tasty bump-and-run from the hybrid club led to a conceded par, and back to a 1-hole lead for Kearns.

A fine showing on the par-3 13th restored Kearns's 2 hole advantage. Both players skirted danger down the right side on 14. Morris hit a harder draw than intended from there, and was unfortunate to find the hazard on the left. However, he was building his own highlights reel, and a towering 8-iron over trees found the putting surface, leaving him in the unlikely position of having a makeable putt for par. Kearns showed excellent course management skills though – a smart punch over the trap on the right and a layup shot to the middle of the fairway left him with an easy approach shot to the green. Morris missed his par putt to allow Kearns to extend his advantage to 3 holes.

Running out of holes, Morris got a chink of light when Kearns pushed his drive into trouble on the right on 15. More good course management from Kearns though as he punched back into the fairway and hit his approach shot safely to the back of the green. 2 putts later, another hole won, and more importantly, the match was won 4&3.

Although he hit a few errant shows in the match, Morris's undisputed golfing talents shone through several times over the course of the round, highlighted by birdies on 17 and 18 as the players played in once the match was over. Playing right at his handicap, Kearns played excellent golf in a highly entertaining match, and is the 2014 Green Tour Matchplay champion!

This includes respecting your hosting member(s), club members, and fellow guests by strictly observing the rules of golf and etiquette when you play, arriving on time for events, keeping up a reasonable pace of play, and wearing our team colors at events.
- Fair Competition: We expect members to follow the golfing creed of integrity, fairness, and

propriety in everything they do on and off the course. This includes keeping your GHIN up to date and taking seriously our Green Tour rules and committee instructions, recording your scores accurately and completely, and following the rules of golf.

- Fun: We strongly encourage members to engage in the competitive side of the Tour but don't forget to enjoy your golf. We also expect you to participate in the social sessions after each event. As a green tour member, we want you not just to sign up for the golf but the social element as well. This includes contributing to the written and visual recording of events, the online craic and participating in the skins/bookie's book.
- **Friendship:** We ask that members use the opportunity the Green Tour presents to get to know all of our fellow members better personally and professionally. For this reason, we encourage members to reach out to other members they don't know, make new members feel welcome, and join as many of the competitions that they can.
- Family: We are privileged to be able to spend time away from our families to enjoy each other's company over competitive games of golf on world-class courses. For this reason, it is important to recognize the role our families play in our support and why informal gatherings and participation in the annual gala event are family-affairs.
- Leadership through Service: Green Tour members are encouraged to participate in activities representing members and sponsors of the Green Tour in our community. We look forward to supporting the causes of our members like the Fado Cup, St. Baldricks, Clan na Gael, the Irish consulate, Irish Chamber, etc..
